KUALA Lumpur mayor Datuk Seri Mohd Amin Nordin Abd Aziz has ordered an illegal sand-washing site to be shut down.

The project, which does not have the necessary permits from Kuala Lumpur City Hall and the Federal Territories Land and Mines Office, was operating along Sungai Klang facing the 5th Mile of Jalan Kelang Lama.

The sand miners have managed to dodge the authorities for years as they camouflaged their location by planting huge trees and building a hoarding around the site. The area is visible only from the air.

"We have sent a team to investigate the matter and the site has been shut down as instructed by the mayor," DBKL executive director (Socio Economic Development) Datuk Mohd Saufi Muhamad said.

"A meeting chaired by the Federal Territories Ministry was also held with multiple agencies in attendance to discuss the matter," Mohd Saufi added.

When StarMetro visited the site on Monday, it looked like operations had ceased. No one was around. A tipper lorry and two excavators were abandoned at the site. A crude washing system used to wash the sand was also left behind.

When contacted, Drainage and Irrigation Department (DID) River Basin Management Division deputy director Datuk Mohd Azmi Ismail said in a text message: "The issue was mentioned in a coordination and implementation committee meeting for the River of Life (RoL) project chaired by the KSU (secretary-general) of the FT Ministry recently.

"DBKL was directed to do the enforcement. The FT Ministry will call for a meeting to carry out a coordinated enforcement exercise for the entire stretch of the RoL project." he added.

Last week, StarMetro exposed the illegal sand-washing site operating along Sungai Klang, only 8km away from the site where the Government is spending billions of ringgit to rehabilitate the river under RoL.

This is the third illegal sand-washing site that has been shut down for operating along the

KL stretch of the 120km-long Sungai Klang in the past two years.

The activity was being conducted on private land. However, residents had spotted tipper lorries and excavators plying Jalan Kelang Lama at different times of the

several hundred metres away from the site to avoid being detected

Sand-washing had been identified as one of the culprits polluting the river. It also contributes to other problems, ranging from air to noise pollution as well as the health of the river.
